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ABSTRACT

Pegasys (peginterferon alfa-2a): This is a registered trademark of Hoffmann-La Roche Inc. Interferon is a protein that reinforces the body's immune system to help fight infections and severe diseases.

Bordeaux Saint-Émilion: Saint-Émilion is a winemaking appellation specific to the Bordeaux region of France.

Illusione: The Illusione collection is one of the most popular classic collections of bed linens by Frette, a fine Italian luxury producer of linens and home furnishings since 1860.

Dans Mon Lit: A bed-linen spray created by Bruno Jovanovic, the Dans Mon Lit fragrance is a combination of half Turkish rose essence and half Rose Water Essential.
